

### Book Review by Derek Skues

A POINT OF INTEREST, A Social History of The Point Estate, Ricketts Point, Beaumaris 1919 - 1975 by Tom Glass, 2024

Coinciding with a reunion of the remaining three generations of the descendants of Harry and Violet Shaw, my cousin and fellow Beaumaris Probus member, Tom Glass, has published this extensive, illustrated book on our family history in Beaumaris.


It traces the development of Beaumaris, including numerous photographs, from the late 1800s through to 1975, the year our grandmother, Violet Shaw, died. It also gives the background on why the Shaws relocated to 19 acres at Ricketts Point from a large pastoral holding in western Victoria, at a time when Harry was actively participating in the First World War as an officer in the Royal Flying Corps.



During the Shaws residency at The Point and subsequent relocation to the converted stable, now known as Pointside, at 11 Lang Street, the property was used in various ways, including a landing ground for Harry's aircraft, breeding of up to 2,000 laying hens, a caravan park, the Benson and Shaw plywood boat building business, fund raising events for the Royal Children's Hospital and even staging theatrical productions.

While the book revives personal memories for me of my first six years living at The Point and subsequent 17 years living in my parents' house, at 407 Beach Road, it should be an interesting read for other residents of Beaumaris.

### SOMETHING OF MYSELF—book review by Duncan Gibson (Rudyard Kipling 1865 - 1936)

I had been unaware that Kipling had written an autobiography until discovering a book inherited from my late father, assigned for reading by literature students at Murdoch University where he took a degree.

Kipling is of course famous for his 'Jungle Books', 'Captains Courageous', 'Recessional' (from which we get the expression 'Lest we forget') and numerous other works that rank as classics of the English language. One of the most widely read of all writers he was Britain's first Nobel Prize winner for Literature, in 1907.

His life was one of privilege but also much hardship. As a child he was left in an unfriendly boarding house in England where he was routinely bullied and punished while his parents followed their careers in India. As a young man he worked for colonial newspapers where he developed an economical writing style, mixed with many notables including Prime Ministers, military leaders, and common people, gaining insights to the great socio-political movements of the day. Interesting fact - on average 9,000 British soldiers in India were laid up annually with venereal disease owing to the 'impropriety' of inspecting the health of prostitutes.

Recommended reading for anyone interested in the history of English colonial life and times.

# **Guest Speakers**

#### The Opportunity of AUKUS for Victoria

**Mr Rowswell**, MLA for Sandringham (Shadow Treasurer), while unsure of the opportunities that would come from AUKUS for Victoria, spoke enthusiastically about the state's capacity to make the most of opportunities that might present. Prior to entering politics, Mr Rowswell worked as a communications manager for Raytheon Australia. For 25 years Raytheon Australia has been a capability partner for the Australian Defence Force, delivering sovereign, whole-of-life capability solutions. Since 1 January 2022 RA has won contracts in excess of one billion dollars.

Mr Rowswell highlighted great success stories of Victorian manufacturing in the defence industries field citing two examples, the Bushmaster, built by Thales in Bendigo and the production of F-35 fighter jet components in Victoria by Marand Precision Engineering. Thales in Australia develops, manufactures and supports military vehicles. The Bushmaster is built by Thales at its Protected Vehicle Centre of Excellence in Bendigo. Development of the Bushmaster began in the 1990s. The first Bushmasters were delivered in 2005 and continue to be produced. Marand Precision Engineering (Marand), headquartered in Melbourne since 1969, is a global supplier of precision engineered solutions to a range of industries, including aerospace, defence, rail, automotive, mining and energy. Marand has engineering, manufacturing and sustainment facilities in Moorabbin and Geelong as well as overseas.

Through the production of F-35 fighter jet components Marand plays a crucial role by manufacturing over 700 critical parts for the F-35 and exporting the F-35 engine trailer to over 10 countries. Marand has strong partnerships within Victoria's local supply chain, which provides expertise in areas like complex surface treatments, precision gears, castings, and testing. Victoria's manufacturing capabilities are enhanced by its history as an automotive manufacturing hub and the presence of numerous start-ups, research institutions, and educational facilities focused on advanced manufacturing techniques. By driving awareness of these local capabilities among Australian leaders in aerospace and defence, Marand believes Victoria is well placed to increase local demand and fully utilize its testing and assembly facilities, solidifying its position as a global leader in the industry.

Questions followed, and Mr Rowswell was given a warm thankyou. Our Club, being non-political, is neutral in respect of opinions expressed by Mr Rowswell . Our expectation was Mr Rowswell would solely focus on the opportunities for Victoria generated by AUKUS; political elements, not catalogued here, were not expected. Secretary

#### The Message Stick

**Tim Harding** gave members an insight into one of Australia's first military newsletters from World War 1, the Yandoo Newsletter a product of the AIF 7<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery Brigade, meaning 'message-stick' - which began in 1926 and continues today. It was not an official publication, but recorded matters of general interest to personnel on board ship heading for war zones. There were messages from Sir John Monash and British General Birdwood as well as news from abroad such as the Russian Revolution, but careful self-censorship ensured there were no 'blue' jokes, as the newsletter was often read by wives and girlfriends. Those on board ship to read it included not just service-men but gunners, bombardiers, chefs, drivers and assorted others. Tim's talk included selections from bound editions of the newsletter and photographs of some of the men involved in its inception.
