



Book review by Tim Harding

'My Life - My Story' by Ralph Butcher, 2015. 189pp.

I had the privilege of sitting next to fellow member Raph Butcher (1918-2024) at couple of our Probus lunches. Being a history buff, I was fascinated to hear his very lucid stories about technological change over the last 100 years, and especially his WW2 experiences in North Africa, Sicily, Italy and Greece. (I suspect that Ralph was pleased that I knew something about the battles he had fought in).

Ralph wrote this book longhand aged in his nineties. It is most comprehensive, covering all aspects of his long life, and includes lots of interesting family and other photos. He was born in London in June, 1918, of English parents. His father was a missionary at Aird Hill in a remote and somewhat dangerous part of southern Papua New Guinea, where Ralph lived with his parents and sisters for six and a half years, using Australia

as a home base.

He was sent to boarding schools initially in Sydney and later London, where he completed his education later graduating from London University with a degree in optical science. This would later prove useful during the war when repairing gunsights, binoculars and rangefinders etc.

In the 1930s, Ralph and his friends became increasingly alarmed not only at the rise of Nazism but also the appeasement policy of the British Government and its lack of rearmament. When war was declared, he tried to enlist at Australia House, but was told he would have to travel to Australia at his own expense, then return to Europe to serve. Not a good idea, so he enlisted in the British Army. He rose from an NCO to the rank of Captain in charge of an anti-aircraft unit, where he was 'Mentioned in Dispatches'.

After the war he served with a unit established to receive UK Prisoners of War and assist them in their return to civilian life. This led to a change in his career towards later senior positions in human resources and training with BHP then CRA (Rio Tinto). He met and married an English girl, Christine Manning, who joined him on the ship repatriating him back to Australia.

Ralph Butcher joined Beaumaris Probus in 1989 and served as our President in 1996. He was previously Functions and Activities Officer and continued to attend some of our social events to near the end of his life. At the age 101, he was named Bayside Senior Citizen of the Year.

Tom Glass gave us an impromptu report on an excursion to the Jayco factory in Dandenong, the largest manufacturer of recreational vehicles is the Southern hemisphere has 900 employees. Jayco was founded 45 years ago by Gerry Ryan, starting in Cranbourne and employs a range of tradesmen including carpenters, welders, sheet metal workers, gas fitters, electricians and others. It was the second of two fascinating Probus trips to see how caravans, pop-tops, campervans, motorhomes and other vehicles are produced on our doorstep. Tom reported that the excursion was an eye-opening experience for all those in attendance.

An Adventurous Life

Our main speaker for October was Captain Rob Anderson who told us highlights of his colourful life at sea. He worked on offshore and specialist ships for many years but, he said, he grew up as a ratbag (his words). His father was a ship's master and sent him to Haileybury College, which he hated. Despite the regulations, he managed to escape to sea at age 15, becoming a deck-boy on a general cargo ship at four pounds a week, but was soon intrigued by the life he led. A turning point in his life was being confronted by a ship's captain who impressed him with the shiny buttons on his jacket. That was enough for him to decide to study to become a ship's mate - the next rung on the career ladder - which meant going to a navigational school in New Zealand; he was on his way. One of his early jobs was working for a salvage company for Lloyd's of London, recovering sunken ships. Sadly, however, he was sacked from that job by his father, but he needed sea-time to progress further, so he joined the sea cargo industry which meant a week in ports around the world, which he enjoyed. The next major change to impact his lifestyle was Malcolm McLean's invention of containers and the offshore oil industry in Bass Strait, which paid very well. However, being on small ships in dangerous and turbulent waters he encountered for the first time in his life something unexpected: seasickness. Nevertheless, his sea career extended to trips to Antarctica, piloting ships through Port Phillip Bay, Torres Strait and the Great Barrier Reef, usually bulk carriers, and forming a new association of pilots which meant buying a helicopter to assist their work. Eventually, when he failed a medical because he couldn't waddle like a duck, he realised it was time to retire, becoming an instructor at the Maritime Technical College as well as a civil celebrant. Tales from the Junction

Kevin Reed's 10-minute talk highlighted the area he grew up in - Balaclava Junction - assisted by an aerial photo. The junction is unique in Australia - trams can turn in every direction. He lived next door to two-and-a-half acres of neglected scrub surrounding the 1857 mansion, 'Rosecraddock'. Originally of 20 acres, stretching from Hawthorn Rd to Kooyong Rd, it once sported the Melbourne Polo Club. Recently renovated, the beautiful landscape now opens onto Keverell Rd. He described the evolution of Caulfield Central RSL (from Major-General Johnston's 'Yerangle') and a convent, 'Cambria' and its tower's role overlooking the Racecourse. The highlight of his presentation was the story of Irish PP, Fr O'Brien, a noted equestrian and racehorse owner who founded St Aloysius. To assist the church's completion, his family in Co Clare dispatched a promising gelding, Redeven, which he quietly trained, registered at the last minute and tipped parishioners about its debut. It won by a nose; the steeple was promptly completed.

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
